Dear CTK family,

Although in the United States "Groundhog Day" is celebrated today, for Catholics it is **the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord.** According to Jewish custom/law, a woman was ritually impure after childbirth. This, the 40th day after Christmas, marks the time when Mary was allowed to present her newborn son in the temple. Joseph would make an offering as a gesture of "redeeming" him and dedicating the child to the Lord; a tradition that goes back to the time of Moses and the death of the first born of Egypt prior to the Exodus.

Today is also known as "Candlemass Day". This morning, a symbolic representation of candles that will be used throughout the year are blessed as they will highlight Jesus as the Light of the world. We are all called to consider and be drawn to the light of Christ's presence in our world and within our lives. May the light of Christ dispel the darkness of sin, selfishness, and whatever else separates us from the love of God and neighbor.



CTK Parish Social Justice Assembly Report and Follow-up

On a beyond frigid January 14 at Christ the King Church, a group of about 40 members representing All Saints, Christ the King, St. Rita and St. Roch challenged the weather and gathered to brainstorm social justice issues concerning us all, and our planning for the future as a new larger parish. At the end of the 90-minute meeting, two overarching topics were agreed upon as the main focuses for further attention:

- Environmental issues, especially the issue of flooding in University City: assigned to
 the "Environment Team". Identified the following tasks: assessment of what is currently being
 done, CTK's "environmental footprint" (including solar panel grant, in-process), use of cleanup
 programs, etc. Team members participating in follow-up on the tasks identified include
 Patrick Connors, Todd Dean, Diane O'Brien, and Lora Ionatti. This team has scheduled its next
 meeting for February 25 at 11 a.m. at CTK.
- 2. Continuing the outreach to families serviced by each church despite "All Things New" changes in our parish structure: assigned to the "Needs Team". Mary Abkemeier (from St. Roch) and Mimi Taylor-Hendrix (from Christ the King) are co-chairing the gathering of data on this issue. They have asked each parish to report all activities carried out in each of the four parishes to address the needs of residents in their community. Parish leaders have been asked to return this information by February 15 so that it can be reported to the SJ Committee.

Based on the schedules of these Teams, the next meeting of the CTK 2.0 Social Justice Committee has been scheduled for Wednesday, February 28 to review the input and results of their work. It will be held at 7 p.m. in the Monsignor Ryan Center, immediately after the 6:30 p.m. Mass.

Many, many thanks to all of the CTK, All Saints, St. Rita's, and St. Roch's parishioners who made this process possible and so productive. Our four parishes have contributed outstanding talent, commitment, passion, and leadership to our efforts to become a community dedicated to the mission of Catholic Social Teaching. Please continue to participate by sharing your input, talents, and passion for our community.

Christ the King will be hosting a *National African American Read-In* on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>February 11, 2024, following the 10:00 Mass in the MRC.</u> Everyone is welcome.



The National African American Read-In (AARI) is a groundbreaking effort to encourage communities to read together, centering African American books and authors. It was established in 1990 by the Black Caucus of the National Council of Teachers of English to make literacy a significant part of Black History Month. This initiative has reached more than 6 million participants around the world.

Sue Anne Whitener will read the children's book, *Leola and the Honeybears*, by Melodye Benson Rosales. A fun retelling of Goldilocks and the Three Bears that is appropriate for ages <u>3-5</u>, but enjoyed by all ages.

After the children's book has been read, Art Wynkoop will give a brief overview, and read a few passages from, *Intellectuals and Society* (2nd Ed.), by Thomas Sowel.

Unfortunately, the activity that was planned for the children during the second story reading has been cancelled. As we approach the season of Lent, we might ask, "What should I do with the dried palm from last year? Blessed items, also known as sacramentals, are to be treated with respect and not thrown into the trash. Dried blessed palm is being collected in containers at the Church entryway from now until Sunday, February 11. This collected palm will be burned; palm ashes can be used on Ash Wednesday, or they may be buried.

Christ the King is pleased to introduce Steve Givens as our Retreat Facilitator. He is a retreat and spiritual director and a widely published writer on issues of Catholic-Christian faith and spirituality. He is the executive director of the Bridges Foundation, which brings Ignatian spirituality and the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius Loyola to everyday life for those in the St. Louis region. He is also a musician, composer, and singer who lives in St. Louis, Mo., with his wife, Sue. They have two grown and married children and five grandchildren.

He has been a regular contributor to the daily devotionals "Living Faith," "Living Faith Kids," and "Living with Christ" for 35 years and writes a blog at *givenscreative.com*. For the last ten years, he has given

retreats and presentations at parishes and retreat centers — to, for, and with lay people and religious orders, including the Jesuits, Marianists, Dominicans, Franciscans and Alexian Brothers.

Diagnosed in 2007 with a rare blood disease, he underwent chemotherapy treatment for more than three years, and that experience is the subject of his book, "Embraced by God: Facing Chemotherapy with Faith," released in 2010 by Twenty-Third Publications.

A native of St. Louis and a long-time (and now retired) administrator at Washington University, Steve is a graduate of the Spiritual Direction program at the Aquinas Institute of Theology in St. Louis and now sits on the Institute's Board of Trustees.
